Fast forward the calendar to about 3-4 months from now, fast forward the calendar to Advent a season of anticipation of the coming of Christ. We are going to hear a message to be watchful, to ready for the unknown hour when the Lord is going to come. We anticipate hearing this message then and when we hear this message we will excitingly respond to this message by getting ready for Christmas because we believe that Jesus is coming at Christmas. We look forward to hearing that message then, but today in August, in the middle of Ordinary time 19 of 34 weeks we hear a similar message today. Jesus tells us to "Gird your loins and light your lamps and be like servants who await their master's return'" (Luke 12:35-36). As out of place as it may seem to hear these words be ready for the master's return, I think it is important for us to hear these words today and perhaps reminded of these words. Because the unknown hour that we think will come at Christmas and having the Season of Advent to get ready, the unknown hour may not

happen then but could happen at a different time during the year. The unknown hour could be today. So, if the unknown hour could happen at any time are you ready today, for the unknown

You would think the answer to this question about being ready for the unknown hour would seem to be clear, black or white, either you are ready, or you are not. I will be honest as I think of that unknown hour and I think of my life there are parts of my life that look good, and I can proudly say I am ready. But then again, I look at my life and I see parts of my life that I am not exactly proud of parts of my life need some work needs to be done. That would put me in place of a deserving punishment, I have some work to do before unknown hour, I am not ready for it just yet.

Our scriptures speak of servants awaiting the master's return. In a certain sense this parable reminds me of growing up, when Mom and Dad would leave for work and leave my brothers and I at home. They would usually leave before we were up in the morning but before they left for work, they would leave a note, part of the note would tell us what to have for lunch and the other part of the note would usually have a list of chores that they wanted us to get done before they got home from work. Most days the assigned work got done the way it was supposed to get done. But I will also admit there were some days the chores that were assigned did not

get completed or done the way it was supposed to, on those days, usually a punishment followed. And the punishment that followed was usually given to teach a lesson, given out of love. In just the same way in our own lives we do the best we can in doing the Lord's work and the Lord finds us to be faithful. But other times we might not do as well doing the Lord's work or we might fail to do the Lord's work altogether.

In these moments the Lord has a lesson to teach us out of love in how we are called to be more faithful in doing his work.

May we be faithful and ready for the Lord to come and open the door for him.



# Catechism Corner

# Transfiguration: Our Call to Mission

The Feast of the Transfiguration, celebrated on August 6th, commemorated Jesus revealing his divine glory. The Transfiguration is a pivotal moment, the point where human nature meets God. Three disciples, Peter, James, and John were invited into Jesus's life in an intimate way—to see him in his glory, his humanity stripped away and his divinity made visible to them. What they witnessed at the Transfiguration called for a response in their faith. God's glory, revealed to the apostles, was undeniable. How could one *not* respond? HOW *did* they respond is the question. Did they marvel in this truth simply by keeping it themselves? Or, did they act on it? While it is true that Jesus told them not to share what they saw at the time, *verbally*, they did share — by living it!

First, they believed more profoundly that Jesus was the Messiah, the One to come and save them. Their deep belief caused them to *LIVE* their belief by ministering to those who did not yet know or know fully the truth of Christ Jesus. They ministered to those who were suffering, alone, widows, the outcast and the poor.

The Transfiguration was a foreshadow of Christ's Resurrection into new life. The old passed away and the new life began. We are called to have a transfiguration of our own in which we die to ourselves and live fully in a new life with Christ just as Peter, James and John. That life of Christ, as witnessed by Jesus Himself and the Apostles, is a life of love and love leads to service. It is a life that turns away from self and shines His light onto others.

We are invited into this same intimacy with Jesus each time we celebrate the sacraments, enter into prayer, or reach out to a brother or sister in need. Need can be found everywhere. Perhaps it's regularly visiting your neighbor who now lives alone. Perhaps it's welcoming a visitor to our community or church that is searching for a faith family. Perhaps it's showing compassion to a co-worker who is having financial, career or family difficulties. Perhaps it's mentoring a young person lost in immersion of the world and not finding fulfillment. Being that light of Christ to others means looking at the people and situations around you with eyes of faith; eyes that see beyond the obvious and looks into the heart.


There are also earthly, material needs that we are called to be of service which can also be found all around. Perhaps living like Christ is giving a helping hand with a community group like cleaning the park gardens. Perhaps it's helping with a school function like volunteering to assist at field days or read to student whom need some extra help. Perhaps service is helping at the nursing home or hospital by visiting residents or patients to bring them hope or even bring them the Eucharist and prayer. Perhaps it's stepping in to assist someone at the grocery store who is in a wheelchair while pushing a cart. Perhaps it's serving the needs of the church like becoming an extraordinary minister or lector or usher. Perhaps it's sending cards or making a treat for someone who had a bad day. Undoubtable there are as many examples as there are needs. Put on the eyes of faith to see where Christ's hands and feet are needed in this world. He has no hands but yours. He has no feet but yours. He has no mouth or ears but yours. (St. Teresa of Avila)





History was recently made when Planned Parenthood and other big abortion businesses were banned from receiving federal Medicaid dollars for one year. Help us to faithfully commit ourselves to the service and defense of human life —especially where it is vulnerable or threatened. Obtain for us the grace to do the will of God in all things. Amen.



# Leading the FLCOCK BY BISHOP DANIEL E. THOMAS

# "I will take the chalice of salvation and call on the name of the Lord" (Psalm 116:13)

These words are taken from the Psalm Response most often chosen for the Ritual Mass with the Ordination of priests. In fact, it was these very words we prayed this year during the of our ordination three priests! These words express the sentiments of the psalmist who prays in thanksgiving that the Lord has heard his prayers and supplications. He writes: "Because he inclined his ear to me, therefore I will call on him as long as I live." In the Ordination Mass, as we pray these words, we thank the Lord for all he has done for us in the gift of new priests, we thank the Lord for all he has done for us in shedding his blood to save us, and we thank the Lord that our priests live to pour themselves out for us as did Jesus himself.



Just two years ago I wrote that the Eucharist and the Priesthood are inseparable and highlighted our great need for diocesan priests in the July 2023 Leading the Flock column. At that time, we introduced a new initiative for the Diocese of Toledo which invited everyone in our Diocese to pray one Hail Mary each day for an increase in priestly vocations, and to do some fasting or abstinence for the same intention. There is no doubt that your prayers and intentional fasting and abstinence are bearing fruit. Over a three-year period we've accepted 1, then last year 4, now this year 6 new seminarians! And more are coming!

Two years ago I observed: "While the challenges we face may seem daunting, I ask that you approach your prayer and fasting/penance for priestly vocations with hope. Just think, if every parish in our diocese sent just one man to the seminary every ten years, we would have 122 seminarians over a ten-year period. If just half of them were ordained priests, we would be ordaining an average of over 6 men per year! This would be a huge shift from our current 20-year average of less than 2 ordinations per year. Dare we hope?"

Now, we find ourselves in this Jubilee Year of Hope, called to be Pilgrims of Hope, and recognizing signs of hope! Please join with me in renewed prayer and renewed hope for priestly vocations!

As with our Diocesan Prayer, we are committed to praying for all holy vocations, conscious in particular of the need for deacons and consecrated women religious. Pope Saint John Paul II reminds us: "There can be no Eucharist without the priesthood." So in these final days of the month of July, dedicated to the Most Precious Blood of Jesus, I am renewing my call that *every* person in our diocese continue or begin to offer a daily Hail Mary, along with some weekly Friday observance of fast or abstinence, for the intention of priestly vocations for our diocese. We need men who are ready

and willing to take up the chalice of self-sacrifice and call on the name of the Lord, and to offer the Body and Blood of our Lord at Mass. We need men who are ready and willing to make present the Lord's Paschal Mystery both at the altar and in their very persons. We need more priests who are happy, holy, humble, healthy, and honest. We need more priests, and with God's grace and your prayers, more priestly vocations will come.

With that in mind, this month we are launching a new initiative in sending out, over time, to all our 122 parishes, two traveling "chalices" provided by our Knights of Columbus, for the purpose of inspiring prayers for vocations, in particular priestly vocations. These are actually replicas of chalices, with an artistic representation of the body and blood. One chalice will travel through the northern counties and the other chalice will travel through the southern counties of our 19 county diocese. My intention with this effort is to till the soil of our diocese with deep prayer asking,

or better, begging the Lord to send more priests to serve in our local Church. Each chalice will spend one month on display in a prominent place in the parish church as a visible reminder for the parishioners intentionally to pray for holy vocations, with a particular emphasis on praying for priestly vocations. It may result that parishes and schools may take the initiative of having their own traveling "chalice," which could go from family to family and classroom to classroom, to pray for an increase in priestly vocations. I know some have started this already. May it continue!

It is so encouraging that we have 6 new seminarians for the Diocese of Toledo this year – the largest number of new seminarians in a decade! That raises our total number of seminarians to 14. We are already seeing the fruit of our intentional prayer, fasting and abstinence!

And where do such young men come from you might ask? They come most often from families and parishes that are striving for holiness; from families and parishes that encourage the young to serve the Church. You will find such young men at daily Mass, praying quietly in the church, attending Eucharistic adoration, stopping in for confession, or selflessly serving their neighbors. A daily habit of listening and talking with the Lord after reading from the Gospel of the day allows them to hear the voice of God, to more closely attend to the Will of God for their lives, and to act with courage and conviction.

In the recent 2025 CARA report on newly ordained priests from around our country, we find the following insightful information:

- 89% said they were encouraged by someone to consider the call to the priesthood
- 78% of them spent time in Eucharistic Adoration before entering seminary
- 73% attended Catholic School, either elementary, high school, or college, before entering seminary
- 72% were servers at Mass growing up
- 72% said they pray the rosary
- 66% of the newly ordained priests said it was a priest specifically who encouraged them to consider the priesthood
- 66% of the new priests were in full time employment before entering seminary
- 50% attended public school, either elementary or high school
- 46% said they served as lectors at Mass
- 15% were homeschooled
- 6% were in the military prior to entering seminary

That report also shares that the loudest voice of discouragement for a man considering the call to the priesthood can be a family member. I want to reassure all our families that it is a source of joy and grace to have a priest in the family because the priest son or brother can be, for those close to the Church and those family members far

removed from the Church, a genuine bridge to God. One of the most significant ways a family can support a young man considering the call to the priesthood is to promote the habit of daily prayer and openness to whatever God has in store for him, even if that may be different than what you might expect or desire for him. Openness of family members to welcome a priestly vocation may well be critical in a young man's discerning his vocation. Because God's plan is always the best plan for all our lives.

To any young man reading this column, I want to encourage you and assure you that being a priest is an amazing and rewarding life! It is a full life, a blessed life, and a life deep with meaning and purpose. Yes, you should have a natural desire for marriage and children, but if God is calling you to the priesthood, He will give you the grace joyfully to live out the life of chaste celibacy, obedience, and prayer. Quite simply, priesthood is a heroic adventure of selfless service in the person of Christ Jesus! I am confident more and more men are coming to see it as such! The same qualities that would make for a great husband and father are the same qualities we are looking for in candidates for the priesthood - loving, selfless and self-possessed, kind, prudent and sensitive, strong, faithful, dedicated to the poor and those in need, prayerful, patient, joyful, and courageous! Above all, we need men who are serious about their spiritual lives and about prayer, which brings interior peace and an abiding sense of God's presence.

Please join me in welcoming the travelling chalices throughout our diocese. May each parish take in the replica of the chalice of salvation, and may parishioners call on the name of the Lord. I am confident that these chalices will prompt us to pray for more young men who are ready and willing to respond to a priestly vocation, to take the chalice of salvation, and to call on the name of the Lord!


