When I was in my teens, I remember being told that in life there are only two things that are guaranteed taxes and death. While I do not deny these guarantees of life, what I find interesting is that we spend a lot of time and energy avoiding these guarantees of life. I mean take taxes, for example many of us do not like paying taxes and so we like to do things so that we pay as little as we can in taxes. But let's face it as much as we try to avoid paying taxes, we still have to pay taxes. Death all of us are going to die one day, the day and hour is concealed from us, there is no getting out of it. But again, like with taxes we make life choices with hope of extending our lives and not dying. We seek to go on diets, we try to eat right and healthy, we exercise, we try to get proper sleep and relaxation, and we do much more. We do all this with hope of keeping on living and extending our lives but doing all these things does not help us to avoid reality that we are going to die. Now I am not saying we should not do these things with hope of extending our lives, I think these are good things for us to do. But my point is that we are going to die.

Our scriptures today remind us of the reality of death. We hear the vanity that the one who labors with wisdom, skill, and knowledge must leave his property because he is going to die. Someone in the crowd said "Teacher, tell my brother to share the inheritance with me" (Luke 12:13). Whoever it is that said this, telling to share the inheritance would seem to imply that someone has died. We also hear of the rich man whose land produced a bountiful harvest and wants to build larger barns for his stuff that his life will be demanded of him tonight. While death is certain and the day and hour is hidden from us, and one day we will leave our stuff behind for others and we will die. Perhaps our scriptures might be a reminder for us to have our affairs in order. While it may be important to have our affairs in order, I do not think this is the point the point Jesus is trying to make in our scriptures today.

In this parable with the man whose land produced a bountiful harvest, the problem is not that his

land produced the bountiful harvest. I think the problem is that this rich man wanted to use his bountiful harvest as an end. He wanted to tear down his barns and build larger ones to store his grain and other goods and then he could sit back and enjoy. Rather I think the hope that Jesus would have had for this rich man would be that he used his abundant harvest to help another whose harvest was not as abundant or not at all.

PILGRIMS OF

At times we can be like this rich man in the parable we can have an abundant harvest, the Lord can bless us with an abundance of gifts that we want to keep them to ourselves and not share. May we unlike this rich man use our abundance as means of helping someone whose harvest is not abundant or at all.

Catechism Corner

Saying, "I do" As a Sacrament, Part 3

The past two weeks the Catechism Corner has answered common questions about the Sacrament of Marriage. This last explains what the Church teaches on divorce and annulment.

Does the church offer any programs to help couples to improve their marriage? Yes. Some parishes throughout the country offer couples to participate in an experience called Marriage Encounter, which offers a weekend retreat and ongoing community support.

What can a couple do if their marriage is in trouble?

Parish priests, deacons and other pastoral ministers are available to talk to couples and to refer them to counselors and programs that can assist them. Retrouvaille (Ree-tru-VEYE) is an effective program that helps to heal and renew marriages in serious trouble. This is a weekend experience put on by couples who have rebuilt their marriages.

Does the Church grant divorces?

Divorce, understood as a dissolution of a marriage, is not possible between two baptized persons. Jesus forbids divorce, decreeing that husband and wife are "no longer two but one. What God has therefore joined together, let no man put asunder." (Mt 19:6) St. Paul is consistent with Jesus' teachings: "To the married I give charge, not I but the Lord, that the wife should not separate from her husband (but if she does, let her remain single or else be reconciled to her husband) – and that the husband should not divorce his wife." (1 Cor 7: 10-11) The Church is clear that a "ratified and consummated marriage cannot be dissolved by any human power for any reason other than death. (CCC #2382) Note that when the Church grants an annulment, it is not a divorce 'Catholic-style".

What is an annulment?

An annulment is a declaration by a tribunal (Catholic church court) that a marriage thought to be valid according to Church law actually fell short of at least one of the essential elements required for a binding union. A valid Catholic marriage results from four elements: (1) the spouses are free to marry; (2) they freely exchange their consent; (3) in consenting to marry, they have the intention to marry for life, to be faithful to one another and be open to children; and (4) their consent is given in the presence of two witnesses and before a properly authorized Church minister. Unlike civil divorce, an annulment does not erase something that was already there, but rather it is a declaration that a valid marriage was never actually brought about on the wedding day. A declaration of nullity does not deny that a relationship ever existed between the couple, or that the spouses truly loved one another.

How can a couple married 20 years get an annulment?

The annulment process examines the events leading up to, and at the time of, the wedding ceremony, in an effort to determine whether what was required for a valid marriage was ever brought about. While a marriage of 20 years provides evidence that a couple had some capacity for a life-long commitment, the duration of their relationship in itself does not prove or negate the existence of the marriage bond.

If a marriage is annulled are the children from it considered illegitimate? No. A declaration of nullity has no effect on the legitimacy of children, since the child's mother and father were presumed to be married at the time that the child was born. Are annulments expensive?

Fees associated with the annulment process vary within the U.S. Most tribunals charge between \$200 and \$1,000 for a standard nullity case. Fees are typically payable over time, and may be reduced or even eliminated in cases of financial difficulty. Other expenses may be incurred when consultation with medical, psychological, or other experts is needed.

How long does it take to get an annulment?

It usually takes 12 to 18 months to complete the entire process.

Prayer for Struggling Marriages

Father, we lay all troubled marriage before you today. We ask you to please revive these relationships. Renew their love for one another and help the couples to work through their differences with respect. Lord, we declare and decree that any plans of the enemy to scatter these relationships will not prevail in the name of Jesus. We trust you God to restore all troubled marriages to bless the couples with unity, love, respect, honesty, and fruitful communication. Amen





In today's Gospel reading, a man tells Jesus that his brother is being unfair to him. But Jesus knows that the man is just being greedy, so He tells him the

parable of the rich farmer. One year he had such a good harvest that he couldn't fit it all into his barns. He tore down his old barns and built new ones, so that he could store his food for many years. But just when he thought he would be able to rest and enjoy his food, God told him that he would die.

This parable is a warning against being greedy. Jesus is not saying that we should not save some food or that we shouldn't save our money. He is just telling us to remember that we are going to die one day, and then everything we saved is going to be useless for us. He wants us to use the things we have wisely, but not be too attached to them.

Think of something that is really special to you. How would you feel if you lost it or it was taken away? Do your feelings show that you care too much about things? Try to think of your belongings in such a way that if you lost them you wouldn't be too upset. After all, none of your stuff is going to matter to you when you die!




