

Today's scripture from Isaiah interweaves the gifts of the holy spirit with some of the virtues to offer insight on how we can use these gifts to help us to grow in virtue. How we can apply each of these gifts and grow in virtue? Through the wisdom of God help us to grow in wisdom ourselves and grow in the virtue of faith. The gift of understanding to remind us to be merciful to everyone we interact with and grow in the virtue of justice. Use the counsel of God to help us discern the choices in our lives and grow in the virtue of fortitude. Spiritual strength to help us to be able to pick up our cross and follow Him and grow in the virtue of charity or love. Grow in our knowledge to be able to decide between right and wrong and grow in the virtue of prudence. The fear of God to remind us to always look to Him for guidance, always trust in Him, and grow in the virtue of hope. These gifts are given to us through our baptism and they are energized or further put into action at our confirmation. This scripture also makes a connection of these gifts to the virtues of justice and faith. Reminding us that we need to be mindful of the gifts that have been bestowed on us and through the application of the virtues we can calm the storms of our lives. We can be like the lamb inviting the wolf to be our guest or like the calf taking a walk with the lion. God gives us the ability to bring joy to the world, it's up to us to use our gifts well.

Paul's letter to the Romans builds on the virtues by reminding us to find encouragement through scripture to strength our hope. It's through this hope and the practice of the virtues that we build unity with others. Rightly ordering these virtues we will glorify God for the mercy he expresses to all of us.

The contemplation of empowering the gifts of the Holy Spirit in our lives to become more virtuous, is a great prelude to Matthew's Gospel today about John the Baptist. John cries out from the desert "Repent for the kingdom of heaven is at hand". The scriptures speak of the prefiguration of John as the one who is preparing the way for the Lord. How is he telling us to prepare ourselves? Through the act of reconciliation. The scriptures today give us great incentive to get to confession during this season of preparation. In fact, we have our penance service here at St Johns this coming Tuesday evening. Are you preparing yourself for the coming of Jesus as John tells us today? Maybe it's been a while since you've been to confession. That's ok! I'm confident any priest you go to will be more than willing to help you through the steps. Reconciliation is one of the sacraments we can receive often! Every time we participate in one of the seven sacraments of the Catholic church we receive graces. And the grace we receive is strength to help us through the difficulties, our cross to

carry, that we face every day. Every time we receive the eucharist we receive more grace. The reception of the sacraments are a part of the beauty we find in the Catholic faith. It's what makes being Catholic different from other religions. The beauty of the sacraments reminds me of a lesson we learned in sacramental theology. The Catholic church teaches there are four important qualities for the sacraments. Every sacrament should be valid, licit, beautiful, and fruitful. Valid means the proper words and materials are used. Licit is about how well we follow the rules and laws of the church such as Canon law. Beauty is what we see all around us and how we carry out the sacraments, the church building, the art, the statues, the craftsmanship, the decorations, the vestments, and so much more. Those first three can be measured in some manner, were the right words said, did we follow the direction given in the missal or ritual book, are we wearing the proper vestment colors assigned to the ritual. Fruitfulness is much harder to quantify. Fruitfulness is how well each of us responds to the graces that flows from every sacrament. So as you come forward to receive the sacrament of the Eucharist, ask yourself, how well am I responding to the grace I receive? Am I channeling this grace and using the gifts of the Holy Spirit to grow in virtue and prepare myself for the coming of Jesus at Christmas?



SNOW EMERGENCY LEVELS

Diocese of Toledo Snow Emergency Policy: "Whenever a county/city within the Diocese of Toledo is placed under a Level 3 Snow Emergency, during which all roadways are closed to non-emergency personnel, the Catholic Churches within that geographic region will cancel the scheduled Saturday Vigil, Sunday, or Holy Day Masses. Roman Catholics in that region, therefore, are dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass. If Masses are cancelled, Catholics are encouraged to participate in Holy Mass via television, radio, or internet, making a spiritual Communion.

If Putnam County is ever under a Level 3 Snow Emergency the regular Mass times will be canceled here at St. John's. There will be a Mass at Noon, if you can get here safely you are welcome. If not, we encourage you to watch it on cable channel 3 or on our YouTube page. Level 1 and Level 2 if you can get here safely you are welcome.

Saying yes to God's call doesn't stop at retirement.



For more than 40 years, he has ministered in the Diocese of San Angelo, Texas, where he became known for his compassion, humor and unwavering dedication to those in need. His belief in the dignity of every person has guided his priesthood and continues to shape the way he approaches each day.

In retirement, Fr. Joe's heart for service is as lively as ever. He preaches for Unbound on weekends, traveling nationwide to encourage sponsorships for children and elderly in need. Towering over most crowds, he still inspires everyone he meets and, when he isn't spreading joy, you might find him cheering on his favorite sport, football.

Catechism Corner

ADVENT PEACE

During Advent, God is inviting us to enter into spiritual preparation; a time of reflection and anticipation as we await the birth of Christ. To prepare to welcome Christ into our hearts, we continue to look at the four virtue themes of each week of Advent. Last week, the Catechism Corner looked at the virtue of Hope. Hope is the trust that God will fulfill His promises, just as He did with the coming of the Messiah. We hope in expectant anticipation of Christ coming amongst us!

This second week of Advent focuses on the virtue of peace. Peace is a gift that Christ brought to the world when He was born. Considering all the chaos surrounding Mary and Joseph...they were traveling to a crowded city with a very pregnant Mary on a donkey, Mary and Joseph were unwed at the start of the pregnancy which could have meant stoning to death of Mary, their travel and arrival to Bethlehem was hard and they found no place to stay, except a stable, and there was no warmth there or in the hearts of the people. After Jesus was born, Joseph and Mary discover King Herod is out to find and kill the new born king...considering all the chaos... Mary and Joseph found peace. A peace that only Christ can bring. The Messiah has arrived!

The Gospel reminds us that as the angels appeared to the shepherds, they proclaimed: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men with whom he is pleased" (Luke 2:14). Catechism # 2304 says, "Peace is not just the absence of conflict", but the presence of Christ himself, bringing rest to our souls and reconciliation. Peace invites us to make amends with our neighbor. #2304 continues, "Peace cannot be attained on earth without safeguarding the goods of persons, free communication among men, respect for the dignity of persons and peoples, and the practice of fraternity. Peace is "the tranquility of order." Peace is the work of justice and the effect of charity."

Advent is a time for seeking the sacrament of reconciliation, as a way to receive the peace that Christ offers. We seek the peace in brotherhood with others and in our own hearts. Other ways to cultivate peace during the Advent season could be:

- 1) Create a quiet space for reflection by setting aside a few moments each day for silence and prayer. Light an Adent candle, meditate on Scripture, or simply sit in stillness.
- 2) Prioritize meaningful traditions by choosing a few family traditions to continue or start. Perhaps it's praying the Rosary, setting up a Nativity scene, attending a special Advent Mass, or singing 'O Little Star of Bethlehem' while placing the star atop your Christmas tree. Let these traditions remind you of the purpose behind the season.
- 3) Like Mary and Joseph, practice patience in the midst of busyness. Advent teaches us to wait with hope. Embrace this lesson by being patient with yourself and others during stressful moments. If the holiday to-do list feels overwhelming, take a step back and focus on what truly matters.
- 4) Simplify gift-giving by considering thoughtful simpler alternatives such as acts of kindness, handmade items, or a donation to a charity in someone's name. These choices can reflect the true spirit of giving.
- 5) Prepare your heart, not just your home. While decorating and planning holiday gatherings can be joyful, don't let them overshadow your spiritual preparation. Use Advent devotionals, attend Reconciliation, or reflect on how you can grow closer to Christ during this season.

Advent is a beautiful opportunity to shift our focus from the chaos of the world to the coming of the "Prince of Peace."
