#### **SNOW EMERGENCY LEVELS**

Diocese of Toledo Snow Emergency Policy: "Whenever a county/city within the Diocese of Toledo is placed under a Level 3 Snow Emergency, during which all roadways are closed to nonemergency personnel, the Catholic Churches within that geographic region will cancel the scheduled Saturday Vigil, Sunday, or Holy Day Masses. Roman Catholics in that region, therefore, are dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass. If Masses are cancelled, Catholics are encouraged to participate in Holy Mass via television, radio, or internet, making a spiritual Communion.

If **Putnam County** is ever under a Level 3 Snow Emergency the regular Mass times will be canceled here at St. John's. There will be a Mass at Noon, if you can get here safely you are welcome. # **2** FROM THE DESK OF FATHER MATT

In our scriptures today we hear of Jesus touching a man that had leprosy and curing him of his leprosy. And us living in 2024 it is easy for us to overlook this touching of the man with leprosy and cleansing him of leprosy and seeing this as being important but we may misunderstand the importance. But Jesus touching this man with leprosy was a big deal and curing this man of leprosy was a very big deal. Us living 2024 leprosy is a disease that exist in our world but is treatable and is not as serious of condition as it was at the time of Jesus and Moses. In our scriptures today the LORD instructs Moses and Aaron what they are to do if a person has leprosy, that person is to "keep his garments rent and his head bare, and shall muffle his beard; he shall cry out, 'Unclean, unclean!' As long as the sore is on him, he shall declared himself unclean, since he is in fact unclean. He shall dwell apart making his abode outside the camp." (Leviticus 13:45-46). This is the description of what you are supposed to do if you have leprosy. This instruction reminds me of what we were supposed to do in the early days if someone tested positive for COVID-19 or was exposed to it. You may recall that you were supposed to guarantine yourself for a certain amount of time so that you would not infect others. Leprosy, COVID-19, or really any sort of illness it causes for us to quarantine, to live outside camp, it causes for us live outside of community. And this living outside of community happens for a variety of good reasons. Medical professionals might recommend this so that we do not spread the disease further or sometimes this is done so that the infected one's condition does not become worse. At other times we live outside of community because that is what our bodies are weak, we do not feel like being part of community and our bodies need to heal, to get strong again. Our bodies need to be strengthened to heal; they need rest to be strengthened so that we feel up to go back into community. Jesus by touching this man with leprosy was a risk to Jesus possibly exposing him to being contaminated with leprosy, and Jesus making himself to live outside of the community, the camp. But this touching was also cleansing this man of leprosy and it was bringing him back into community. Likewise, when we recover from our illness and are healthy again, we have the strength to go back into community, back into the camp.

We are a few days from Ash Wednesday and starting the Season of Lent. It is often said that the Sunday readings before Ash Wednesday can provide a good reflection to prepare for the season of Lent. As you prepare to begin the Season of Lent what ailment, sickness, or illness do you have that is causing you live outside of community, what is keeping you away from Jesus? What in you do you need Jesus to touch to bring you back into relationship with Jesus, to bring you back into community?



### CATECHISM CORNER

#### Lent Begins with Ash Wednesday

As the first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday awakens us to Jesus' entry into the desert preceding his death. Before Easter, we must prepare our hearts for his Resurrection. We begin our season of preparing our hearts for Easter by recognizing our brokenness and need for conversion, a turning of our hearts to God.

The word "Lent" comes from Old English and German words that describe spring and the lengthening of days. The practice of dedicating 40 days to prepare for Easter has been a practice of the Church since the fourth century. Before he met God and received the Ten Commandments, Moses spent 40 days in fasting and prayer. Jesus himself, before he began his public ministry, spent 40 days in prayer and fasting in the desert. Ash Wednesday then falls 6 ½ weeks before Easter.

#### What is the Importance of Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday dates back to the 11th century. The faithful attend Holy Mass and receive ashes on their head as a symbol of our mortality. The ashes are a physical reminder that our bodies will decay, but our souls will live on in eternal life. Three practices have always defined the Lenten season of preparation: prayer, fasting and giving to the poor. Jesus speaks of these disciplines to his followers because they were pillars of Jewish practice. The three practices touch on all of the ways in which we relate: prayer is about our relationship with God; fasting is about our relationship with ourselves; and giving to the poor is about our relationship with others, especially those who are in need. Catholics are accordingly encouraged to dedicate themselves to a regular practice of prayer and to make use of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Catholics also devote themselves in a special way to the poor by offering money, support, or time in service. Many Catholics also fast from some luxury or indulgence during this time. The priest or Extraordinary Minister, dipping his thumb into ashes (collected from burnt palms of the previous year's Palm Sunday), marks the forehead of each with the sign of the cross, saying the words, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you will return" or "Repent and believe in the Gospel." By marking the sign of the cross with ashes on the foreheads of her children, the Church gives us:

- 1- a firm conviction that a) we are mortal beings, b) our bodies will become dust when buried and ashes if cremated, and c) our life-span is very brief and unpredictable;
- 2- a strong warning that we will be eternally punished if we do not repent of our sins and do penance; and
- 3- a loving invitation to realize and acknowledge our sinful condition and return to our loving and forgiving God with true repentance as the prodigal son did.

#### Do I need to be Catholic to receive ashes?

You do not need to be Catholic to receive ashes on Ash Wednesday. Several other traditions within Christianity also share this act of repentance.

#### Obligations of Ash Wednesday: Fasting and Abstinence

The guidelines for fasting and abstinence that apply to all Catholics during Lent are simple: On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, the faithful between the ages of 18 and 59 fast, which means they have only one full meal in the day and use smaller snacks to sustain their strength. On these days and all the other Fridays of Lent, Catholics 14 and older abstain from meat.

#### **Prayer and Almsgiving**

In addition to fasting and attending Mass (or a service where ashes are distributed), you can recognize Ash Wednesday through prayer and almsgiving—the other two pillars of Lenten observance. In prayer, consider listening to the Daily Gospel, praying the rosary, or engaging in Spiritual Writing to discern what you'd like to focus on in your relationship with Christ this Lent.

Almsgiving doesn't have to only consist of giving monetarily. Christ desires your heart to conform to His, so instead why not consider what you can rid your life of to grow in holiness. Take a look at the Seven Deadly Sins to see where you struggle. Once you have identified that area of needed growth, try to avoid the sin and replace what you give up with a holy act instead. For example, commit to give up outbursts of anger when upset, or voicing frustrations or complaints during Lent and replace it instead with offering compliments to others. Perhaps you find yourself to be envious of other's good fortune. Try instead to focus on your blessings by keeping a Gratitude Journal daily. Whatever you choose to give up, try to replace it with kind acts, or virtues, that will work toward your goal of holiness. As we begin Lent today with Ash Wednesday, let us be renewed by prayer, fasting, and giving to the poor.

## **NOTE FROM SEMINARIAN ERIC KAUFMAN**

Greetings Everyone,

I believe the Diocesan Annual Catholic Appeal is beginning soon, so thank you in advance for your continued yearly support of this fundraiser, which helps fund our time in the seminary.

This semester is number twelve of fourteen of my seminary career, and it is full of some excellent classes: Ecclesiology II, Theology of Holy Orders, Reformation and Modern Church History, Theology of Blessings and Rites, and lastly, Prophets. In just a few weeks, these classes have already had a tremendous impact, where I have gained many insights that connected to different conversations I had and talks I had given over Christmas break.

One talk I gave over Christmas break was to the High School CCD program about the history of St. John the Baptist parish and incorporating the need to give back to God. While talking about the church, I mentioned how no matter how bad things were trying to live on the edge of the Great Black Swamp, the focus for our ancestors was always, yes, survival, but with God at the heart of all that they did. For they did not have much, but they knew what they had been given in time, talent, treasure, and life-were all gifts from God. We, too, are called to recognize the same thing and to give back to God, in service to Him, what He has blessed each of us with, even in our vocation, which might be, to serve him as a priest, religious brother, or sister.

Many might ask how we can do this. This giving back? All we need to do is look to the two greatest commandments. Love and serve God, and then love and serve our neighbor. This love grows by having a continuing relationship with Jesus – turning to him in the Eucharist, which is only found in the Catholic Church, and to His word in the scriptures. We must then continue to learn about the Catholic Faith that we profess so we can live it out and share the Gospel of Jesus with everyone we meet. Encounter the Lord, learn the faith, and put it into action. No matter our age, occupation, or state in life.

"Then he [God] said to me, Son of man, take into your heart all my words that I speak to you; hear them well. Now go to the exiles, to your own people, and speak to them. Say to them, whether they hear or refuse to hear: Thus says the LORD God!" (Ezekiel 3:10-11)

By our baptism, we are all called to be prophets, and we might not always be successful, but that does not matter. We are called to be faithful to God and to put Him before everything else. Much of our current world measures us by what it sees as success, but God measures us by our faithfulness to Him. Only by being faithful to God will we be truly successful. For humanity does not remember Hollywood or sports stars for centuries, but the saints of God live on.

Here are some ideas on how to share our Catholic Faith at any age. Pray every day, especially the rosary. Another is dressing up for Mass. By doing so, we show that the Mass and God are important to us and are worth looking our best for. We usually dress our best when we receive the sacraments (Baptism, Matrimony, First Holy Communion, etc.), but why do we not always dress our best for God in the sacrament of the Eucharist at every Mass? A small indirect way to send a reminder about Jesus is to use religious stamps throughout the entire year, like the Madonna and Child Christmas stamp. Volunteering in the parish is also a great way to give your time and talents back to God and the church. Whether by joining the choir, CCD program, or outreach groups or by signing up to pray at adoration or for a half hour for the first Saturday all-day rosary, which has been happening in Glandorf since World War Two. There are many ways to give back to God in the parish and our families, but it requires sacrifice. For if we are not putting God first in our lives, something else will take his place: pleasure, money, power, etc. Thus, we end up placing ourselves and our wants over God and what He wants for us.

Lastly, "Habemus Majorem!" (Latin for, "We have a Mayor!")

Having been on Glandorf Village Council for almost five years before entering the seminary, I had hoped to run for mayor someday, but God had other plans. I never would have guessed that I would still have the opportunity to carry that title one day. Each school year, there is a seminary mayor who is like the senior (deacon) class president/head of the student body. Usually, this is a deacon from the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, but after the votes were counted, my classmates elected me as seminary mayor for the next school year (2024-2025). To my knowledge, I will only be the second non-Cincinnati mayor. The first was also from the Diocese of Toledo, Fr. Jeremy Miller, in 2012-2013.

Thank you again for your continued prayers and support. Please know of my prayers for all of you. If you are ever in Cincinnati, please stop by the seminary to visit. Take care, and God Bless!
